PASTOR'S NOTES

Christmas - the gift that defines all giving!!

Christmas is always a special day, especially for children as they tear into their Christmas gifts and their spirits leap for joy when they get something they really wanted. Gift-giving is a treasured way of showing our love for other people.

Of all the gifts ever shared in all of human history Christians believe the Christmas gift of the Christ Child defines all measures of selfless love-giving.

Christmas celebrates the <u>mystery of the Incarnation</u> when God assumed our human nature or as the Prologue of John's Gospel declares — "In the beginning was the Word, the Word was in God's presence, and the Word was God ... the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." Every time we pray the Creed we say, "... he came down from heaven and by the Holy Spirit was <u>incarnate</u> of the Virgin Mary and became man." Of this the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) says: "Belief in the true <u>Incarnation</u> of the Son of God is the distinctive sign of Christian faith." [CCC 463]

All of this leads to a very logical question — Why did God assume our human nature? St. Peter Chrysologus [406-450] gives the over-arching answer when he says the human race takes its origin from two men — Adam the first man and Christ the second man. The first man (Adam) was made by the second man (Christ). Christ had stamped his image and likeness on the first Adam when he created him. Adam's sin has deprived us of God's likeness. This is why Christ took on himself the role and name of the first Adam — in order that he might not lose what he had made in his image. That is why Scripture says of Christ, "I am the first and the last." In essence the Father's gift of Christ (the second man) restores the goodness lost by Adam (the first man).

In paragraphs 456-460 the Catechism of the Catholic Church says the Word became flesh for four (4) reasons:

- (1) The Word became flesh for us in order to save us by reconciling us with God. St. Gregory of Nyssa [ca. 330 ca. 395] says it this way, "Sick, our nature demanded to healed; fallen, to be raised up; ... We had lost possession of the good; it was necessary for it to be given back to us. Closed in the darkness, it was necessary to bring us to the light; captives, we awaited a Savior; prisoners, help; slaves, a liberator. Did they (meaning the human race) not move God to descend to human nature and visit it, since humanity was in so miserable and unhappy a state?";
- (2) The Word became flesh so that thus we might know God's love. As John's Gospel says, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." [In. 3:16]
- (3) The Word became flesh to be our **model of holiness.** As John's Gospel has Christ saying, "I am the way, and the truth and the life; no one comes to the Father but by me." [Jn. 14:6]
- (4) The Word became flesh to make us **partakers of the divine nature.** St. Athanasius [296-373] puts it this way, "For the Son of God became man so that we might become God." St. Thomas Aquinas [1226-1274] says it this way, "The only-begotten Son of God, wanting to make us sharers in his divinity, assumed our nature, so that he, made man, might make men gods."

Such is the gift of Christmas, and why Christmas is the gift that defines all giving. It is in this spirit that we say 'Merry Christmas'!!!


