PASTOR'S NOTES

Epiphany & Baptism of the Lord

In most years the Solemnity of Epiphany and the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord are separated by a week, but this year they follow one upon the other. Sunday [January 7th] celebrates the Lord's **Epiphany** and Monday [January 8th] celebrates the **Baptism of the Lord**. Each of these days celebrates a great truth in the life of Christ and his revelation of God's Truth to us. As Jesus will declare, "... the truth will set you free." [Jn. 8:32]

In its most basic form the solemnity of the Epiphany is the story of **the magi** coming to Bethlehem. They represent the Gentile world *(non-Jewish people)* coming to worship a new born king of Israel. The Gentile world, unlike the Jewish nation, had not had the privilege of having had prophets announcing God's love affair with the human race. Yet here they come! **The point is** – *All people throughout history, who seek the Truth and the meaning of life, will find it in the person of Christ born in Bethlehem.* The Gospel of Jesus Christ is the story of salvation for the whole world that will come to be in Christ's Death and Resurrection. As John's Gospel tells us, "... anyone who accepts him, he empowered to become children of God." [Jn. 1:12]

An Epiphany devotional practice is to have chalk blessed and then use the blessed chalk to inscribe upon the door frames of our homes the inscription — **20+C+M+B+24**. As the Holy Family welcomed the wise men, may the doors of our homes this coming year be as welcoming. 2024 represents the present year; C-M-B traditionally represent the first letter of the names of the three wise men — **Caspar, Melchior, Balthasar**; the four crosses represent the four Gospels that tell the story of Christ, Savior of the World!

On Monday, January 8th the Church celebrates the **Feast of the Baptism of the Lord**. In its simplest form it represents the beginning of Christ's public ministry in the land of Israel. **But**, a moment's reflection brings to mind a basic question – **Why is Christ baptized?** For most Christians baptism is associated with the removal of original sin from our souls. Today's feast celebrates Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist in the Jordan river. **But Jesus is God and sin can have no part of God. So why did Jesus get baptized?** He is sinless and has no need of baptism!

In reading the story of Jesus' baptism, John the Baptist insists that Jesus should baptize him; yet Christ insists that John baptize him. In turn the Church notes a number of points in this feast of the Baptism of the Lord:

- 1) **Christ's baptism** reveals the fact of Christ's divine sonship when the Father's voice declares, "*This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased.*"
- 2) Beyond the Father's voice **Christ's baptism** includes the descent of the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove. This suggests the appointment and anointing (commissioning) of Christ who, in turn, will now begin his 3-year public ministry of redeeming the human race culminating in his death, resurrection, ascension and the sending forth of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost.
- 3) **Christ's Baptism** professes his solidarity with the human race including the sin we bear because of our descent from our first parents and their Fall from grace *now he will restore the likeness of God that had been lost by the sin of Adam and Eve.*

4) Christ's Baptism in the waters of the Jordan river makes all the waters of baptism holy.

<u>As St. Maximus of Turin declares</u>, "Christ is baptized not to be made holy by the water, but to make the waters holy... For when the Savior is washed, all water for our baptism is made clean, purified at its source for the dispensing of baptismal grace to the people of future ages."
