PASTOR'S NOTES

'Going to Mass' — a highly ritualized meal

In this third Eucharistic reflection and the subject of 'going to Mass', I would like to visit how the Mass is structured and explain some of the ritual actions that are found in the Mass. This reflection will take us up to the Offertory time.

Last week's reflection examined how at the Last Supper Christ radicalized the Jewish Passover meal when he took the bread and wine of the Passover meal and declared it to be his body and blood. He asked us to do this in remembrance of him. In essence Jesus left us himself in the context of a meal.

Meals are very important events in all of our lives. A meal is never a 'once -in-a-lifetime' occasion. We constantly need to sustain our lives. Jesus knew that rich understanding and left the Eucharist as a reminder of our constant need for spiritual nourishment. Secondly, a meal implies the gathering of people usually having something in common and therefore, telling of stories and eating food. Such is the structure of a meal and such is the structure of the Eucharist.

The Eucharist (the Mass) is structured in that two-fold way: there is the first part of the Mass through the Prayers of the Faithful, which is known as the <u>Liturgy of the Word</u> [telling the stories of God's interaction with the human family]. The second part of Mass begins with the Offertory and ends with receiving Communion and final prayer. This is known as the <u>Liturgy of the Eucharist</u> [eating a meal by feeding on the Lord's Body and Blood]. In its deepest sense 'going to Mass' is a highly ritualized meal.

All good meals have introductory parts (e.g. - preparing oneself like hand washing, greeting people, small talk, etc.). Then comes serious conversations and eating of the meal. Likewise, the Mass has introductory rites.

In preparing for the Eucharistic meal we <u>sign ourselves with holy water</u> acknowledging our entry into church life through the waters of baptism. We <u>genuflect towards the tabernacle</u> acknowledging God's presence in our midst. After spending a short time in <u>personal prayer</u> we rise and together sing with joy our being invited to table with the Lord. The priest <u>kisses the altar</u> signifying a place of great honor *[from which the Lord's Body and Blood will be given at Communion]*. Having made a private sign of the Cross upon entering the church we now make a <u>communal sign of the Cross</u> marking us as the Body of Christ (the Church).

Being invited to communion with God should humble us and make us aware of our unworthiness. We do this by <u>calling to mind our sins</u> and seeking God's mercy. We believe his mercy triumphs and so we sing the <u>Gloria</u>. Having properly prepared ourselves for Mass the priest prays the <u>Opening Prayer</u> [Collect], which looks forward to the spirit of the stories [Liturgy of the Word] we are about to hear.

The <u>Old Testament readings</u> reveal that God's love affair with humanity began long before the coming of Christ. The <u>New Testament readings</u> inform us that the fullness of God's love has come in the person of his beloved son – Jesus of Nazareth. For that reason the <u>Gospel readings</u> hold pride of place and is proclaimed by a deacon or priest. The actual Gospel words to be proclaimed are first traced with the sign of the Cross and then traced on the priest's/deacon's forehead, lips and heart. At the end of the Gospel these very words are kissed paralleling the earlier kissing of the altar signifying the union of word and sacrament.

In the <u>homily</u> the words of Scripture are broken open and made applicable to our daily lives. We summarize this eternal work of God by <u>professing the Creed</u> which acknowledges the Father sending his Son into history and the Holy Spirit keeping alive the memory of Christ by recalling his life, making him present to us and putting us in communion with our Lord and Savior and fellow believers. We end the first part of Mass [Liturgy of the Word] by <u>offering God our prayers</u> of need, thanks and praise for the wonder of love and splendor of truth.

In the next installment we will turn our attention to the structure and many ritual actions found in the second part of the Mass [Liturgy of the Eucharist].
