PASTOR'S NOTES

Ordinary Time & the Gospel of Luke

Ordinary Time is one of five seasons in a church year along with Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. Ordinary Time comprises 33 or 34 Sundays of a calendar year {depending upon the date of Easter} with the remaining Sundays belonging the other four seasons. Also, Ordinary Time is broken up into two time periods – a few Sundays after the Christmas season until Ash Wednesday and the remaining Sundays after Easter Sunday until the First Sunday of Advent of the new church year. During Ordinary Time the Sunday Gospel readings are taken from a 3-year rotating cycle from either Matthew, Mark or Luke. The Gospel of John is read predominately during major seasons and feast days of a church year.

During Ordinary Time, the typical color of Sunday vestments will be green. Green symbolizes that things are alive and growing. We are to be alive and growing now that the Holy Spirit has fully entered into human history, which is what we celebrate every Pentecost. At the Last Supper Christ told his disciples that he would send the his Spirit and that Spirit, "will instruct you in everything and remind you of all I told you" [Jn. 14:26]. It is obvious that the person of Christ is a mystery of profound depth and must be studied frequently to understand its deepest meaning in our lives. So each year we revisit the Gospel story of Christ to probe its life-giving message of salvation. We seek the Holy Spirit's guidance into the mind and heart of the one who saved us so that we may grow more deeply in our communion with Him and enter into the intimate life of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

During this year's Ordinary Time we will be led by the 'Spirit of Truth' and largely take our Sunday readings from the Gospel of Luke. **Who is Luke?**

As with all four Gospels, the Gospel writer is not specifically mentioned in any Gospel text attributed to that writer. This leads to a couple of questions — **how do we know Luke wrote the Gospel attributed to him?** A number of ancient writers/writings dating back to the mid 100s attribute this Gospel to Luke (e.g. - Irenaeus [130-200], Tertullian [160-220], etc.).

In addition, Luke is also considered the author of the Acts of the Apostles. Both books (the Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles) begin with a reference to Theophilus as being the person to whom these writings are addressed. Theophilus may be an individual's name or be a reference to any one 'who loves God' because theo is Greek for God and philus comes from the Greek word -philia - which is translated as love. Therefore, Theophilus could be a generic name for anyone who loves God.

The person of Luke is specifically mentioned three time in the New Testament [Philemon 24, Colossians 4:14, and 2 Timothy 4:11]. In each of these references Luke is a companion of the Apostle Paul and his three mission journeys in the Middle East. In addition the Acts of the Apostles has a number of 'We-sections' implying that Paul and Luke have an ongoing relationship in spreading the Gospel throughout the Middle East. The Colossians reference notes Luke as a physician.

From Luke's Gospel text many scholars believe Luke is of Gentile origin, i.e., he is not a Jew who has converted to Christianity. He has many less Jewish references to the Pharisees and their many controversies with Jesus. He seems very adept with the Greek language and often substitutes Greek names for Hebrew ones (e.g. - the place of the Skull rather than Golgotha; teacher rather than Rabbi; lawyer for scribe; etc.). Luke seems to be a Gospel written for a Gentile audience. In that sense Luke's deepest understanding of Christ is that he is the "universal savior" of the human race and not just the Messiah that the Jewish world was anticipating.

GIVING HEARTS DAY - What is Giving Hearts Day?


