PASTOR'S NOTES

Some Pentecost truth —

183 days ago we began this year's church year with the first Sunday of Advent, but by the time we had reached the last half of Lent and have gone through the entire season of Easter our lives have been dominated by the deleterious effects of COVID - 19.

Does today's solemnity of Pentecost have anything to say to our present state of affairs? On the original Pentecost, 50 days after Christ's resurrection, the risen Spirit of Christ dominates the upper room where the disciples are gathered. The room is filled with a mighty wind and tongues of fire descend upon the apostles. Inflamed by this Holy Spirit the disciples go out to people gathered in Jerusalem, tell the Gospel story of Christ, and on that day 3000 are baptized into the faith. So where is this Spirit today?

The often unrecognized context behind this original Pentecost — **these people were receptive to this outpouring of the Spirit.** These disciples had 'sheltered in place' for nine (9) days of prayer in Jerusalem, the very city that had crucified their Lord and Master. In this time of prayer their hearts and mind were moved to review the three years of public ministry they had shared with Jesus — *the parables, the miracles, the teachings, etc.* In that time of prayer the grand history of Israel began to be seen as God's master plan for the salvation of the human race. God always hears the cry of the poor. He invites us to join him and participate with him as He goes about 'creating a new heavens and a new earth'. For such people Pentecost is not beyond belief.

For people of such faith pandemics can not kill the Gospel. Pandemics of all kinds come from a long history of humans making wrong choices, selling faith short, discounting the interior life and believing man is in charge of his/her destiny. **Nothing could be further from the truth!** God is in charge of history.

For people of faith Pentecost comes with a hosts of truths. In reading the Pentecost story we discover:

- 1) **Easter can not be understood without Pentecost.** Christ's resurrection is not an isolated, one-time event that happened in the distant past. The Resurrection is so stupendous that the fullness of Christ's Risen Spirit overflows into human history as the gift of salvation given to human race for all times;
- 2) when Christ <u>announces peace</u> he shows them his pierced hands and side. With that he reminds us that true peace flows from the wounds of his Passion and is not the result of political rhetoric nor economic agendas. Peace comes from the sacrificial gift of love;
- 3) as Christ <u>breathes the Holy Spirit</u> upon them, this is not meant to say that Holy Spirit has been absent up to this time. Rather, Pentecost highlights how extensive and generous is the life that now comes from the Holy Spirit. Mark's Gospel says Christ breathed his last on the cross of Calvary. **Now in the Resurrection he breathes God's life upon and into his apostles and the life and mission of the Church.** The Holy Spirit brings alive the sacraments of the Church, makes the Risen Christ present in our liturgies, our prayers, sustains every moment of our lives, and sends us on a mission of reconciling the world to God's love so that 'all may be one and he and the Father are one':

In a sense with Pentecost the Risen Christ has become lost in the mission of the Church to the world. He is now found in the sacraments, Scripture, prayer, the charisms and ministries of the church, the witness of the saints, etc.
