PASTOR'S NOTES

Spiritually navigating these 'closed down times'

Sunday will be the 11th day public Masses and church events have been closed down. Right now we are left to ponder in hope when this will pass and life return to normal. No one can give us that date or time. COVID-19 has been a powerful way of teaching us about being creatures, being finite, being dependent! We long for social interaction, for camaraderie, for the gift of others. This all confirms what God said in the beginning — "It is not good for man to be alone" [Genesis 2:18]. But for now all of us are being asked to live at a distance from one another.

This is not an easy walk, but one that has been done before – the lonely walk of Jesus to his city of destiny when things were 'closing down' on him and from there to that hill called Golgotha (Calvary). In all of this he carried within his bosom the conviction that his Father was very near as he always is, especially for those who walk in the faith of God's undying love for the human race.

God is very near to us in these 'muddled times.' Every day the Diocese of Fargo offers televised daily and Sunday Masses and invites us to join in spiritual communion with God and others as we enter into the sacramental mystery of the Father's Beloved Son pouring himself out in sacrificial love for us as he did on Calvary and continues unabated until the end of time. This is the very gift of the sacrament of the Eucharist – source and summit of Christian life and living.

I would highly encourage you to make these **televised daily and Sunday Masses** a rich part of these troubled times. Some have the ability to transfer the diocesan Mass to your regular TV set. In conjunction with the <u>Order of Sunday Mass</u> that we have emailed, this would allow you to view the Mass as a family and join in the readings and responses and the postures of standing and sitting at the proper times. Of course you could also just use the <u>Order of Sunday Mass</u> apart from the televised Mass and individually make a spiritual communion with God and his people.

On the same order we have sent you the <u>Daily Mass readings</u> along with the various antiphons that are said at the beginning of Mass and at Communion time along with a prayer seeking spiritual communion at the time you would normally receive Communion at Mass.

In addition to the televised daily and Sunday Masses I will be celebrating the sacrament of Reconciliation (hearing Confessions) Monday through Saturday. Since our Lenten communal Reconciliation services are being canceled, this provides opportunities for parishioners to experience God's merciful love. In order for that to be done in accord with social distancing, I will be 'hearing Confessions' in St. Leo's sacristy to the left of the altar where the Mass servers vest. There is the option to go behind the screen or face-to-face. The schedule for Confessions at St. Leo's is: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday from 6:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday from 4 to 5 p.m. The schedule for St. Thomas is Thursday from 6:30 to 7 p.m. (St. Thomas' Confessional will have social distance space). At all places and all times I will stay as long as necessary, and as always people can call and set up an appointment. Critical times are especially good times to get right with the Lord who, as Pope Francis has said repeatedly, 'never tires of forgiving us of our sins'. The sacrament of Reconciliation is that great encounter with mercy and forgiveness as we 'make straight the way of the Lord' into our lives.

Lastly our churches are open. These times present numerous opportunities for a variety of prayer forms: bring your tablets or I-phones to watch the televised Masses in the pews of our church; come and simply make a visit to the Blessed Sacrament or spend some time in adoration; come and pray the rosary as an individual or as a family; come and walk the Stations of the Cross with one of the many devotional stations prayer books at the back of the church.

In these 'closed down times' there seems to be a number of 'opportune times' to be close to God who is never far from those who know his promise "that I am with you always, until the end of the world." [Matthew 28:20]
